Pastor's Newsletter

Dear Friends,

Usually at this point in an interim process, that being a

month in, the congregation would begin doing the hard work of beginning the search process. That does not necessarily mean interviewing candidates. No, there are a few steps that need to be done before that happens.

First we do some soul searching. We have some interesting, sometimes frank and candid discussions about the history of the congregation. We look at everything from its founding (I'm guessing none of you were around in 1734 to give us the firsthand insights which are so valuable); the pastors you have had along the way; what has worked and what has not (and why); the mission of the church and its place in the Townsend community; what you value and what isn't so important to you; and, most importantly, how you envision yourselves as a congregation, a Christian community of faith, going forward?

Normally I would be holding gatherings in evenings and after worship on Sundays inviting you to gather and share your insights and stories, your hopes and dreams, and even your fears. We know that change is hard for most people. Some of you like the church the way it is. Others wish it could be something else, maybe something more or something different. Most church people will say "I wish we had more members". Then when new members come and begin to get involved those who wished for more people suddenly become possessive of the old ways and resentful of the new people "trying to take over". The bottom line is that if the church is going to grow it is going to have to change in some way.

My role is to help you begin to negotiate some change. To help you come to terms with who you were, who you are and who you are going to be. It is to prepare the way for the next pastor to come and thrive as your leader.

How we do that during a pandemic is a good question. It seems that we are going to have to put off some of the work until it warms up and we can gather outside safely. I am not comfortable inviting you into a confined space for any length of time. So maybe next month there will be a better plan.

While we might be on hold regarding the beginning of the search process, the season of Lent cannot wait. It looks like Lent in 2021 is going to be much like Lent of 2020 - mostly socially distanced. Ash Wednesday is February 17th and we will have a worship service that night. Probably a mix of live and online. We will celebrate communion so if you plan on

attending in person you should bring your own juice and bread as we will not be allowed to offer them to you.

Again, the details are still in the works so you will hear more about it in the near future. In the mean time I hope you stay home when you can, stay healthy and stay faithful. God is good - all the time. With God's grace, mercy and guidance we are going to endure this pandemic and find ourselves filled with joy and gratitude when it is over.



Lent 2021 Book Study Starting February 24

Dear friends,

Ash Wednesday (February 17th) marks the beginning of the season of Lent, the season of introspection, and lasts for 40 days (not including Sundays) ending on Easter Sunday (April 4th).

Lent is the time of the year in which we actively remember Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness. Lent is a time for us to reevaluate our faith. It is a time for us to deepen our faith. It is a time to better understand the role our faith plays in our lives. It is a time to try to live, even for only a short time, as Jesus did.

Traditionally, during Lent, many Christians practice fasting and/or "giving something up for Lent." The giving up certain luxuries in our lives is meant to help us replicate the suffering and sacrifice of Jesus during his 40 days in the wilderness. Of course for most people the Lenten sacrifice takes the form of giving up chocolate, coffee, alcohol, or something else we desire.

While that does not quite qualify as being equivalent to Jesus' sacrifice in the desert, it is a sacrifice none the less.

HOWEVER, we have already sacrificed so much in the past year that anything we give up for Lent would be almost inconsequential. Thanks to COVID-19 we have all had to give up gathering together for worship, birthdays, and sporting events, to name a few. For a few weeks we had to give up going to the grocery store, the doctor and the gym. Our ability to travel without risk has dropped to almost zero and many of us have not left our homes let alone our communities.

What things have you had to give up that you miss the most? Naturally these losses were due to a societal necessity rather than a Lenten sacrifice, but they are things we have had to give up.

So this year for Lent, instead of inviting you to give something up I encourage you to do the opposite and instead add a spiritual discipline to your Lent as a way to draw closer to God.

Maybe that means reading a daily devotional (you can find a wealth of them on line with a search for "Lenten Bible readings"). Maybe you will commit to saying a prayer each day, be it grace at a meal or as you awaken or before you go to bed. Maybe you can send a card or email to someone telling them you are thinking of them. The possibilities are limitless.

Here is something you can take on - join the BOOK STUDY and deepen your faith and understanding of Lent. Starting on Wednesday, February 24th, I will be leading a discussion on the book *24 Hours that Changed the World* by Adam Hamilton. This discussion will be on Zoom so you don't even have to leave your house. We will begin at 7 pm and be done by 8 pm. The book in not expensive at all. I see them used for as little as 99 cents, and new they are only \$5.99. If anyone has an issue paying for one, or even getting one, please let me know and I will buy it or get it for you.

In conclusion, I know there are a lot of words here. Please send me the list of things you have missed or lost or had to begrudgingly give up due to COVID-19 AND the list of things you are going to take on for Lent 2021. I will find a way to weave these lists into worship.

Order the book 24 Hours that Changed the World and join the book study. It is one more way for us to be together in faith and spirit.






